Chair's Message

It barely feels any time since the 2023 Festival; as always, we were overwhelmed by the hard work, dedication and sheer talent of our performers and all those who support them. Everyone involved responded to the challenge of running the Festival over two weeks and our Finale evening was an uplifting and joyful event. For me it is the week of the Festival, the interaction with our performers, stewards, parents, teachers and adjudicators that makes all the hard work worthwhile.

Being part of the Festival team is a very rewarding experience. Whether it is setting the syllabus for the next Festival, liaising with the schools or stewards, nervously watching our entries grow, fund raising, booking halls, pianos, adjudicators or something as simple as dashing through the Festival Hall to copy a piece of music or prose for an anxious entrant with two minutes until they perform, it all makes a difference.

The Festival has been in the village for over a hundred years and is one of the largest amateur Festivals in the country. I truly believe that the opportunity to perform is vital to our young people. The skills that they learn and the confidence that they gain from standing up in public and performing are essential in adult life. Whether they are applying to college, university, for an apprenticeship, attending a job interview, the ability to be able to positively project themselves is necessary. It is currently a difficult time for Festivals and many of them are closing or scaling back the classes they offer. So, this is an appeal for those in our broader community who value the opportunities this Festival offers to come forward and help ensure this Festival is here for the next generation of performers.

As always, I would like to thank all the venues across Alderley Edge who host us; The Festival Hall, The Methodist Church, St. Phillips and St. James, St Pius X, The Scout Hall, Alderley Edge School for Girls (AESG) and The Ryleys. AESG very kindly stepped in and allowed us to host our Finale evening with them, for which we are very grateful. We also appreciate the generous support of The Emerson Group and Chess. The Festival committee may work all year round but during the week of the Festival it is our Stewards who perform an amazing job and represent the Festival with kindness, commitment and humour, so thank you. My personal thanks go to the Festival committee encompassing Trustees, Co-opts, Honorary Members and our Friends.

This year we are making a change to the running of the Festival. Our morning slots will start at 10 am, rather than 9.30; we hope this will allow the schools who enter a little more time to get their pupils to the Festival. Our afternoon sessions will be split into two halves, running from 2.00pm through till 4.00pm and then flexing around a 4.30pm through to 6.00 pm slot. We appreciate that for many of our older entrants, their focus is on the academic challenges they are facing and that being absent from school during the day is not always possible. We hope that these late afternoon slots, in which we will prioritise the classes for the older entrants will allow them to fully participate in the Festival.

We are also introducing some new classes this year. In Speech and Drama, we have added a dramatized monologue class and in our Music section we have introduced a class for performers who wish to sing pop songs and we will be allowing the use of backing tracks in this class.

The Festival is a balance between tradition and innovation and we want to evolve so that the classes and opportunities it offers reflect what the performers of today want. We therefore need your input and help, from ideas of new classes and ways to improve the Festival to joining us as Friend, a Steward, a Committee Member (see page 2) or advertising with us.

ALDERLEY EDGE FESTIVAL RULES AND ENTRY PROCEDURES 2024

FESTIVAL DATES 30 April - 4 May

The following rules and procedures help the smooth running of our Festival. Please read these carefully before entering. If rules are not adhered to, entrants may be allowed to perform but risk losing the chance of winning and being placed. The decision of the Committee in all matters is final.

Teachers should ensure all entrants are made aware of these rules and the additional notes on pages 42 & 44. Teachers, parents, guardians and carers must read the Child Protection Policy and accompanying notes on pages 51, 52 & 53

ENTRY PROCEDURE:

ENTRY is ONLINE only - www.alderleyedgefestival.com. See pages 46 & 47 for instruction/guidance. Please contact the Coordinators if you do not have access to the online entry system, contact details page 2

- The 2024 online entry closing date is **11.00pm on 23 February 2024.** Entries must be completed by the closing date. Early entries would be appreciated. **All entries will be acknowledged by email to the email address used for the online application and will contain your AE online entry number.**
- Payment through Paypal or BACS system is preferred and using the AExxxxxx online entry number as
 reference. Cheques are accepted with your name, contact number and AExxxxxxx number, on the back,
 made out to Alderley Edge Festival. Cheques must reach the Chair by 1 March 2024. Address 20 Hitch
 Lowes, Chelford, Cheshire, SK11 9SR.
- Please note that 2024 is the last year cheques will be accepted.
- The AExxxxxxx order reference number is a number generated for your application via the online system. Please take note of this number as you require it to retrieve your application and for any queries you may have about your entry.
- If you want to request the services of an **Official Accompanist**, select YES to the question Do you want to use our Official Accompanist?
- We strongly advise that you use the Official Accompanist if you are making multiple entries. We cannot make adjustments for independent accompanists after the scheduling has been done in order to avoid clashes. See page 42.
- The music for the Official Accompanist must be to performance standard, in a manageable, readable
 and playable condition and sent to Music Coordinator Diane Goddard, 68 Hazelwood Road, Wilmslow,
 SK9 2QA by 1 March 2024. The performer's name, Class number, and AExxxxxxxx number, must be
 written clearly on the front of the music. Please do not send any music by Registered Post.
- Please do not send digital or emailed copies of music as these are not accepted.
- Official Accompanists reserve the right to refuse to play from unsatisfactory and unmanageable music. See page 43.
- If the Official Accompanist services are not required, do not send copies of music.
- All performers, whether using independent or Official Accompanist, **must** provide a copy of the music on the day of the performance for the **Adjudicator**.
- The Committee reserves the right to refuse any entry without giving any reason.

OUR RULES:

1. All entries must be accompanied with payment by the due dates to be accepted.

- 2. Entrants may only enter the correct National Curriculum Year class for their age. National Curriculum (NC) year groups will apply where stated. Entrants may only enter graded classes for grade that they are currently working towards or have most recently achieved since the last Festival. Those studying for Diploma should enter the Open Class/Classes. See Table on Page xx for details of NC age groups and definitions of 'Open and Any Age'.
- **3.** Entrants may not enter more than once on the same instrument in the same Class, unless otherwise stated. For Duets, Trios and Quartets see Rule 9.
- **4.** In all GRADED Classes, title of the piece, Examination Board, the grade and composer MUST be supplied with each entry. A copy of the piece must be provided for the use of the Adjudicator at the time of the performance; entrants must use their examination book. Please note that no one may enter more than one graded class on the same instrument and should note Rule 2.
- 5. In "Own Choice" Classes the name of the piece, and composer/author to be stated on the Entry Form, and no change from this choice is allowed after the entry closing date. A copy of the piece must be provided for the use of the Adjudicator at the time of the performance. The Adjudicator will take into consideration the appropriateness of the piece chosen, particularly in respect of age-appropriate nature.
- **6.** In "Own Choice" Classes, entrants may not offer the same piece in more than one class. Performers should not play/perform the same piece in two consecutive years.
- 7. An Official Accompanist is provided, however, entrants in all relevant classes may use their own independent accompanist if they wish and should indicate this on entry. This option may not be altered after the close of entries and, unfortunately, no concessions in respect of the Festival's scheduling can be made to accommodate own accompanists. Official Accompanist will not be available for choir classes, choral groups, ensembles/orchestras/bands/ instrumental beginners/ instrumental Age 21 and above/pupil and teacher duets/ Blues & Rock Guitar or Percussion. We do not allow use of backing tracks, apart from Percussion, Blues and Rock Guitar, Vocal Solo Popular and Drama Without Words Classes where stated.
- **8.** In all Choral, Vocal Groups, Orchestra / Ensemble and Band Classes, please state the number of participants in the online entry.
- **9.** In all Duet, Trio and Quartet classes a second entry is allowed providing the entrant has different partners and performs different pieces. No pair/group may enter more than one class within one instrumental discipline.
- **10.** Professionals are not eligible to compete in this Festival, except where specified. In this Festival professionals are defined as those who derive the bulk of their income from payment for work in that branch of the art with which the Festival is concerned. This also applies to "Open" Classes.
- 11. Orchestras/ensembles/bands may include professionals and experienced volunteers, who are outside the age group, not exceeding one to every ten amateur players.
- **12.** Time limits given in the syllabus must be adhered to. Performers who over-run will risk losing the chance of winning and being placed in their class.
- **13.** Performances using songs from shows are subject to copyright law. We do not allow any changes to the songs from the shows in accordance with the Performing Rights Society's Licence arrangements with the British and International Federation of Festivals. (See page 41).
- **14.** In all Speech and Drama classes **no costumes** are allowed. In Verse Speaking and Prose Reading, dramatisation by actions is not permitted and adjudication is on vocal performance.
- 15. In Young and Junior Thespian, Duologues, Dramatised Verse, Dramatised Poem or Monologue, Solo and Group Drama and Shakespeare classes a choice of **two** props per performer such as a hat, gloves, shawl is allowed. **Over emphasis on props will be penalised by adjudicators and placing will be affected.** No props are permitted in Verse Speaking, Prose Reading, Group Poem and Slam Poetry classes.

PROCEDURES AND OTHER USEFUL INFORMATION

ORDER OF PERFORMANCE:

- The Committee reserves the right to limit the entries in any Class where, in their opinion, the maximum number which can be adequately dealt with has been reached. In some instances, large classes will be divided. The order of performance in each Class will be determined by random selection, but the Committee reserves the right to vary that order where necessary, e.g. when catering for clashes.
- Classes with a small number of entries will be combined with separate adjudication and awards given after all performers have performed.

ADJUDICATIONS:

- Adjudicators' decisions are final. Speaking or writing notes to the Adjudicators is **not** permitted
 during the Festival. Communications for the Adjudicator must be made through a Festival Official.
 Concerns/ complaints will only be considered if submitted in writing to the Chair. Please see the
 complaints procedure at the back of the Syllabus.
- The Adjudicator's notes on the entrant's performance are available at the end of the class or session free of charge. If not collected at the time of the Festival, please contact the respective Co-ordinator for information on how to get the copy.
- The Committee reserves the right to appoint additional Adjudicators and to alter, modify or cancel any of the arrangements detailed in this Syllabus as necessary.

MUSIC AND SPEECH & DRAMA ADJUDICATORS' COPIES:

- Please hand own choice copies or original score or copies of music to the Adjudicator's Steward at point of performance.
- All photocopies should be headed clearly: 'For Adjudicator only to be destroyed after use.'
- Original scores and copies of music downloaded from the internet that do not infringe copyright
 regulations are to be collected by the performer from the Adjudicators Steward at the end of the
 class.
- In 'Set' verse classes, the Speech and Drama Co-ordinator will provide copies for the Adjudicator.

BACKING TRACKS:

- Backing tracks are allowed for Percussion, Blues and Rock guitar, Vocal Solo Popular and Drama Without Words classes **only**.
- Backing tracks must NOT have any vocals nor instrumental parts which plays the same line as the performer.
- Performers must provide their own fully charged portable device to play the backing track.
- The device is to be set up by performer and the performer will be given an extra 2 minutes to set up the equipment before the performance
- If there are technical difficulties with the equipment, the performer may perform without the backing track.

TIMETABLING and PROGRAMME:

- Timetables will be on the website as soon as finalised. Please do not enquire in advance about times and venues as no further information will be available.
- Entrants' tickets contain all necessary Timetable information for the performer.
- The Programme with full Timetable including order of performers will be available in mid-April.
 Programmes can be pre-ordered online with entry (£6.00 including pp) or bought during the Festival (£3.00).

TIMING

- At the end of a Class, if time allows, performers may be invited to take part in a short workshop.
- Entrants who arrive late may perform unless the adjudication of their Class has commenced and is at the discretion of the Adjudicator.

CERTIFICATES AND TROPHIES:

- Certificates will be presented to performers gaining first, second and, unless there is a low entry, third places.
- Trophies and certificates may be withheld in any Class where, in the opinion of the Adjudicator, a sufficiently high standard of performance is not attained. In the case of ensemble classes, one certificate only will be awarded for each qualifying performance.
- Winners are held responsible for the engraving, safe custody and return of trophies gained in 2024.
- Trophies can be returned at any time but must be returned by 31 January 2025 at the latest, cleaned, in their boxes and taken to either:

 - ✓ Mark Rogers, 74 Grove Street, Wilmslow SK9 1DS
- Trophies must **not** be posted in order to avoid any damage or loss
- Damaged or lost trophies will incur a charge for replacement or repair

PERFORMERS' TICKETS:

- All entrants will receive a ticket containing full details of their entries. This ticket is for the performer only. The ticket is to be shown on entry to the venue, however if you do not have the ticket with you, the Stewards in the hall will help and check you are in the correct place.
- Performers who are invited to take part in the Finale will receive one complimentary ticket in addition to their own.

ADMISSION CHARGES:

- Admission charges apply to audience members at all venues -we keep these charges to a minimum
 and allow under 16s to enter day and evening sessions free of charge, apart from at the Finale, when
 there will be a reduced ticket price.
- Admission charges for each venue are set out below and will be listed at the entrances to venues during the Festival.

 parents/guardians/carers do not wish photos to be taken at all, then the responsible adult attending
 should ensure that their child/pupil/vulnerable adult is not included in official authorised photos.
- It is a condition of entry into every venue that the use of cameras, recorders, mobile phones and tablets is not allowed during performances and adjudications, in compliance with copyright law and our Child Protection Policy.
- All electronic devices including mobile telephones and tablets MUST BE TURNED OFF when entering the venue and may not be used for photography.
- The Federation's up-dated information on Copyright Compliance is on page 41 and the Child Protection Policies are on pages 51, 52 & 53.
- The Festival's Official Photographer may attend the Festival.

81 – 83	Merit:	a capable performance showing some artistic appreciation and/or technical ability
78 – 80	Moderate:	a performance showing development of technique and/or communication
75 – 77	Fair:	a performance limited in its communication

The Festival Committee recognises that the Festival is held at a time senior school pupils have exams and academic study commitments. As the Committee is dedicated to encouraging all pupils in pursuing their interest in performing arts, in 2024 the classes for senior pupils will be scheduled outside school hours. The timing for the 2024 classes is outlined in the Provisional Scheduling on the following page.

Graded Music classes, at level 6,7 and 8, will also be held outside school hours.

The week of the Festival is not the designated week of standard assessments for primary schools.

Entry Procedures:

Your attention is drawn to the rules and other useful information on pages 4 - 8.

Entry can be made online **only** and instructions for this are given on pages 46 & 47.

Many Speech and Drama entries will require the book Title and ISBN number along with the authors name and piece performed. This is a part of the Festival's group licence agreement with the Authors' Licensing and Collecting Society (ALCS) and is to ensure that ALCS are correctly apportioning payments to authors and copyright holders, ensuring greater transparency and fairness.

New and changes to Music Classes

- Class 527 Vocal Solo, Popular, any age with accompanist or backing track.
- Class 532 Vocal Solo Beginners NC Y 7-9, non-competitive for senior pupils who have learnt to sing since the last Festival.
- Number of voices in Classes 101 & 102 Junior Choirs and Class 103 Choir increased to 40.

New and changes to Speech & Drama Classes

- Classes 732,733 & 734 Dramatised Poem or Monologue for NC Year 9 & under, NC Year 13 & under and Age 21 & above.
- Classes 714 & 725 changed to Small Group Performance of own choice of drama, dramatised verse or group poem.
- Set Poems are taken from READ ME AND LAUGH ISBN 978-0-330-43557-4
 or THE WORKS ISBN 978-0-330-48104-5

Where there are a small number of entrants in a class, classes of similar disciplines will be combined and run in one session. Separate adjudication and awards will be given after all performers have performed. If you or your entrants are in these classes, please arrive in good time for the start of the session.

Classes with large entries will be divided into A, B & C, as in previous years and the order of performers in each of the classes is determined randomly. Each class will have a separate award.

The Committee reserves the right to change the Trophies presented to winners.

COPYRIGHT COMPLIANCE 2024

The British and International Federation of Festivals (BIFF), of which Alderley Edge Festival (AEF) is a member, works on our behalf to ensure copyright compliance and has negotiated group licensing arrangements with the Performing Rights Society (PRS), the Music Publishers Association (MPA) and the Authors Licensing and Collecting Society (ALCS). AEF have obtained the necessary licences for instrumental / vocal performances at this Festival by paying the annual copyright fee to the Federation.

Specific permission has been granted regarding the photocopying of music, poetry, prose and solo monologue performances as follows:

MUSIC:

Adjudicator Copy – A person performing a work at the AEF in front of an audience may make one copy for the Adjudicator provided that the performer has already purchased his/her publication and that the copy is marked and destroyed immediately after the AEF. The copy must be marked 'Adjudicator Copy. Destroy after use.'

In all cases printed publications must have been purchased and be in the hall at the time of the performance.

The group licence of the **PRS** allows the performing of **music** to take place as follows:

Instrumental & Vocal classes: -the performance of music compositions is possible at the AEF.

Songs from the Shows: - performance of excerpts from musical plays is possible provided that:

 the excerpt is performed without any change to either music or lyrics and uses only the published or authorised musical arrangements and there is no use made of any form of scenery, costume, choreography, character representation or special lighting which changes the portrayal of the original work from which the excerpt is taken.

SPEECH AND DRAMA:

Poetry, prose, solo monologue and drama performances:

The BIFF has entered into an agreement with the **ALCS**. This means that performers do not have to seek copyright permission for any poetry, prose or solo dramatic items performed with a time limit of 10 minutes. Solo dramatic items must be announced by the performer giving the title and author at the time of performance to qualify for copyright indemnity. Words must not be changed and the gender of any character must not be altered.

Duologues and group dramatic works (including Musical Theatre) are not covered by this agreement and copyright for these items should be sought by performers / teachers at the time of entry in the absence of any other licensing arrangements.

AEF has entered into a separate agreement with the Copyright Licensing Agency (CLA) and in this agreement AEF has permission to make copies of extracts from certain books, journals, magazines and other periodicals, in consideration of and subject to the terms of the CLA Licence.

AEF do not allow downloaded material as an accompaniment at this Festival.

Backing tracks are permitted for selected classes only.

IT IS A CONDITION OF ENTRY TO EVERY HALL AT ALDERLEY EDGE FESTIVAL THAT PHOTOGRAPHS AND RECORDINGS WILL NOT BE TAKEN, apart from photographs taken by our professional photographer. This applies to all recording devices including CAMERAS, VIDEO RECORDERS, MOBILE PHONES and TABLETS.



- 3. Teachers are reminded of the limit of 12 entries per class from each school except for Class 804.
- 4. In Set Piece classes the coordinator will provide the adjudicator's copy.
- 5. Please comply with copyright details on page 41 in particular respect of duologue and drama groups.
- 6. All individual names must be provided for group and duologue entries. We have changed the entry requirements for groups and duos to allow a wider age range to perform together. NOTES FOR SPEECH AND DRAMA CLASSES

DEFINITIONS**

The following definitions have been established as guidelines for performers and teachers:

Prose: A prose passage is a selection from a story, novel, essay or similar writing that forms a concise unit. Prose is non-metrical writing: thus stories written in verse are not appropriate. In prose, the speaker is the narrator. The focus should be on the voice. Vocal characterization is encouraged but the quality of prose must be maintained. The selection should include narration, description and dialogue. It should be spoken in the story-telling style, but should not be performed as a dramatic scene, i.e. there is to be no acting, with only very limited movement around the stage. Competitors may stand or be seated.

Drama: In drama the speaker is the character. The selection should be the words of one character only with words of other characters omitted. Shakespeare selections must be taken from his plays rather than his non-dramatic poetry.

Poetry: In poetry, the language is moulded into some kind of design; in prose it is not. Speakers may choose to perform **any type of poetry** including but not limited to: lyric, narrative, dramatic, slam or free verse – matching performance choices to author intention and style.

- Lyric a short unified poem expressing the poet's own experience and emotion usually presented in a relaxed stance with no movement. The speaker interprets rather than identifies with it. (e.g. Solitude by Bliss Carman: To Autumn by Keats; Sonnets of Shakespeare and Wordsworth).
- Narrative a poem which tells a story and usually has dialogue: the telling of a story is the primary concern of the speaker (e.g. The King's Breakfast by A. A. Milne; The Raven by E. A. Poe; The Cattle Thief by Pauline Johnson).
- **Dramatic** in a dramatic poem, a character distinct from the performer and poet speaks, revealing personality and attitudes. The primary concert of the poem is to reveal character, rather than tell a story (e.g. My Last Duchess by Robert Browning; Patterns by Amy Lowell).
- Slam Poetry Idea or thematic connection poems with voice, humour, rhythm, exaggeration, wordplay, written for performance to an audience. Excerpts may be presented as these poems are often very long. Suggested resource books or poems include: "We Are More" (Koyczan), Word Warriors (Olsen), Take the Mic (Smith): Poetry Slam (Glazner).
- Free Verse poetry or 'a poem 'without regular rhythm or rhyme, yet still providing artistic expression (eg. Poems by Walt Whitman, Carl Sandburg or T.S. Eliot).
- **Sonnet** a sonnet is a fixed form lyric poem, traditionally consisting of 14 lines of iambic pentameter with a set rhyme scheme.





DANIEL CHANDLER. After graduating from the Royal College of Music (2000), Daniel performed as a professional flautist in orchestras, chamber ensembles and as a soloist. Daniel also has a teaching degree from Edge Hill University (2006) and a master's degree in Educational Leadership from the University of Warwick (2014). For a number of years Daniel was Assistant Director of Music at Merchant Taylors' School in Crosby and then Director of Music at AKS Lytham. He has conducted choral societies, choirs and numerous other groups in performances across the UK and further afield. This has included directing concerts in Westminster Abbey, Salzburg Cathedral, the United Nations and in St. Paul's Chapel, New York. Daniel is currently Assistant Head of Bolton Music Service which is the lead partner of the Greater Manchester Music Hub. Daniel is a Professional Mentor for PGCE students studying at the RNCM and Manchester Metropolitan University.

PHILIP DEWHURST was born and educated in Bolton, Lancashire. He read music at the University of Newcastle-upon-Tyne under Professor Denis Matthews where he specialised in performance on the oboe. After finishing his degree, he completed a Post Graduate Certificate of Education and pursued a career in teaching. Philip has held several posts as Director of Music in prestigious independent schools in the North West most recently at Cheadle Hulme School, Cheshire from where he has recently retired. Philip gives occasional recitals and enjoys orchestral and chamber music playing on a freelance basis. He has a passion for choral music and has conducted and directed choirs and choral societies throughout his career as well as being musical director for many musicals and shows. In addition to adjudicating at music festivals around the country, Philip is an examiner for Trinity College London and an experienced GCSE and A level moderator.

JOHN GOUGH enjoys a busy career as solo pianist, chamber music player, accompanist, teacher and adjudicator. He has given recitals at the Wigmore Hall, Purcell Room and Carnegie Hall, New York as well as many live broadcasts on BBC Radio 3. John has given Concerto appearances with the Royal Liverpool, the Royal Philharmonic 'Pops, and Northern Chamber Orchestra. He studied at the RNCM with Marjorie Clementi and Gordon Green where he is Senior Tutor in Piano. He also is a piano tutor at Manchester University and has taught at Junior RNCM for 30 years. John has examined at the Royal Academy and Guildhall School of Music and Drama.

BELINDA MIKHAÏL was awarded the Associated Board and the Queen Mother Scholarships to study piano and singing as a joint first study at the Royal College of Music where she won the Hopkinson Gold Medal for her final recital. Since graduating she has travelled extensively performing both as a soloist and as a chamber musician and has appeared as a concerto soloist at the major London Concert Halls. She has made numerous recordings for Sony BMG and Universal and is a vocal soloist on EMI's Vocalise album, while her solo piano playing of the theme from Chariots of Fire was heard at every medal ceremony at the London Olympic Games. Belinda is also in demand as a vocal coach for classical, pop and rock singers and as a widely travelled adjudicator.

CHRISTINA THOMSON studied horn, piano and singing at the Royal Academy of Music. Following a career in Bavaria, she returned to London to perform and teach in a highly regarded independent schools, including the Purcell School. In 1991 she moved to Yorkshire, where she taught at a well-known choir school and two large independent schools, as well as being a player specialising in chamber music. Christina was a Brass Mentor for the Associated Board's professional development course. She has an extensive private practice encompassing ages from 5 to 85 years. As a busy adjudicator and a national and international examiner for the ABRSM, Christina's work has taken her through Europe, Hong Kong, China, Vietnam, Malaysia, India, South Africa and the USA.

STEWART DEATH began his formal musical training at City University in 1984 studying piano with Alan Schiller at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama. Since leaving college he has toured throughout Europe with Concordia Opera Trio and has been heard as an accompanist on Classic FM, BBC Radio and Independent Television. He has worked as an accompanist for Welsh National Opera and has recorded with many artists including Stephen Mead, Roger Webster, Simone Rebello and Andrew Berryman. Stewart has appeared at the Purcell Room, St. David's Hall, the Royal Festival Hall and the Barbican Centre and is an accompanist member of the British and International Federation of Festivals.

KATHLEEN HESFORD started to play the piano at the age of four. She was accepted into the Junior Department of the Royal Manchester College of Music at the age of ten, where she studied piano and flute. Kathleen continued her studies at the RNCM and, after graduating, she chose to specialise in accompaniment, studying with John Wilson and David Lloyd. Kathleen was the accompanist with the Manchester Boys' Choir, a post she held for 20 years. She travelled extensively with them, performing in Canada, Russia, Australia, USA and many European cities. Kathleen now works freelance in the Manchester area, working with several local choirs and teaching piano privately. For several years she has been a repetiteur at the Cranley Choral Week in Surrey.

TIM KENNEDY studied music at Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge, and is now a freelance musician based in Manchester. As well as being a piano accompanist, he also works as a professional singer, vocal coach and organist. Rosalind is a Senior Examiner and Team Leader for The London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art. THE BRITISH AND INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION OF FESTIVALS CHILD PROTECTION POLICY STATEMENT

<u>The British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech</u> work for amateur festivals everywhere to help create thousands of educational performance opportunities for children and young people each year.

The Federation, and our member Festivals, are committed to ensuring safe environments for children and young people and believe that it is always unacceptable for a child or young person to experience abuse of any kind. We recognise our responsibility to safeguard the welfare of all children and young people, by a commitment to recommend best practice which protects them.

This policy applies to our Board of Trustees, paid staff, Adjudicator members, volunteers, students or anyone working on behalf of the Federation and our member Festivals. It has been drawn up on the basis of relevant law and guidance that seeks to protect children and young people, and its purpose is to set out the overarching principles that guide our approach.

We recognise that:

- the welfare of the child/young person is paramount
- all children, regardless of age, disability, gender, racial heritage, religious belief, sexual orientation or identity, have the right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- working in partnership with children, young people, their parents, carers and other agencies is essential in promoting young people's welfare.

The purpose of the policy:

- to provide protection for the children and young people who participate in our festivals, including the children of festival members
- to provide staff and volunteers with guidance on procedures they should adopt in the event that they suspect a child or young person may be experiencing, or be at risk of, harm

We will seek to safeguard children and young people by:

- valuing them, listening to and respecting them
- appointing a Federation Head of Safeguarding and, for each festival, at least one Festival Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL)
- •adopting child protection guidelines through procedures and safe working practice for staff and volunteers
- working within the legislation and guidance that specifically addresses the needs of young performers (specifically, the Children and Young People Acts 1933 and 1963, and the Children (Performance and Activities) (England) Regulations 2014
- adopting a safe and balanced approach to the issue of creating and using photography and images of children and young people at our festivals and in our communications
- recruiting staff and volunteers safely, ensuring all necessary checks are made
- sharing information about child protection and safe working practice with children, parents, staff and volunteers
- sharing information about concerns with agencies who need to know, and involving parents and children appropriately
- providing effective management for staff and volunteers through supervision, support and training.

The Federation will review this policy each year in line with NSPCC guidance or sooner in light of any changes in legislation or guidance.

CREATING SAFER FESTIVALS FOR EVERYONE

The Federation and its member Festivals use the following recently reviewed policies and procedures to provide **Safer Festivals** for everyone:

- 1) A single, definitive Child Protection Policy adopted by all Federation Festivals.
- 2) One or more designated Festival Safeguarding Officer will be appointed by each Federation Festival: For Alderley Edge Festival:

Our Safeguarding Advisor is Pauline Butterfield, MA (Behavioural Forensic Psychology, BA Hons. Professional Studies in Social Work and Diploma in Social Work).

- 3) Best Practice advice is given in the form of a Safe Working Practice Leaflet, Festival Child Protection Leaflet, and any other guidance produced by the Federation. This advice is supported by training for all Festival staff and volunteers and includes clear reporting procedures for anyone with a concern about a child. The leaflets containing the advice and guidance are available on the Festival's website. www.alderleyedgefestival.com
- 4) Appropriate recruitment and induction procedures for all new staff and volunteers responsible for providing safe environments for everyone attending/performing at a Federation Festival and in accordance with legislation. All Festival Committee members are DBS checked.
- 5) All Festival personnel will wear a badge to identify their roles. All teachers/parents/guardians/carers are asked to report all incidents of any nature to anyone wearing a Festival badge. All reported incidents will be handled in accordance with the **Safe Working Practice** and **Festival Child Protection** leaflets.
- 6) We do not permit any unauthorised photography, audio, video/digital recordings at our Festival. If any child, young person or parent/carer is concerned about any photography or recording taking place at an event, please contact the Festival Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) who will be pleased to discuss this matter with you.
- 7) Some children and adults with support needs may require help in order to take part. If this is the case, we ask the responsible teachers/parents/guardians/carers to contact the Festival Organisers prior to arrival. The Festival aims to meet these needs wherever possible but must know beforehand in order to prepare support or to advise that help cannot be provided on this occasion.
- 8) The Festival's Child Protection Policy and its approach to Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone are published explicitly in our Syllabus, Programme and Website. By completing and signing the entry form all parents/guardians/carers and teachers of entrants under 18 (or adults of any age who may require additional support) confirm that they give (or have obtained) the necessary consents for the entrants to take part in the Festival. Without these consents the entry to the Festival cannot be accepted.

The Alderley Edge Festival ("The Festival") is a charity, charity number 500097, whose purpose is to hold or promote an annual competitive music and arts festival and to encourage the education of the public in the arts, notably: **The Spoken Word and Music**

We collect information about you to process your entry to perform in The Festival, this maybe via a third-party entry system. We also contact you about matters that relate to your performance at The Festival or where you have been awarded a trophy at The Festival. We also collect information about supporters of the Festival, for example a volunteer Steward, a Friend of the Festival, sponsors or an advertiser. There is a legitimate interest in processing your data as part of our work, and it is reasonable to expect that you provide this information to complete this work.

Information required may include many of the following:

Name, Address, Email address, Telephone number, Date of birth and age (especially if relevant to the Class entered), Salutation (e.g. Mr, Mrs), Educational establishment, Bank Details (only of Friends), Photographic images

Personal information, in full or in part, will be provided to:

Printing establishment to enable them to produce the programme of events.

Media outlets for promotional purposes.

For Performers, your local licensing authority (if requested) to ensure you meet statutory requirements and are eligible to compete.

The Festival will not share your information with third-party organisations for their marketing purposes.
